WHITE FRAGILITY BOOK STUDY BEGINS JULY 20



PASTOR'S LETTER

Dear friends,

Someone asked me for a copy of a recent children's sermon and that gave me a chance to look deeper into it. Here's what I came up with, and you'll see it's no longer just for children. During our online sermon series on "Exile," I was drawn to reflect on a beautiful

banner painted by the artist Amy Taylor that hangs in our Youth Foyer, just outside our Youth Center. The banner reads, "For I know the plans I have for you," sayeth the Lord" (Jeremiah 29:11). It is important to note that God did **not** say "For I know the plans **YOU** have for you." God said, "For I know the plans **I** have for you."

These are powerful words from a letter the prophet Jeremiah wrote to God's people who were living in exile in Babylon. Presbyterian minister and author Eugene Peterson offers a helpful and concise definition of exile. Peterson says that exile is "being where we don't want to be with people we don't want to be with." (On a side note, can you relate to being in a time of exile in your life? I know I sure can!) "Exile" is exactly where God's people were. They were in a place they didn't want to be, with people they didn't want to be with. Jeremiah wrote this letter to them, and he wanted to encourage them and challenge them in this difficult season of exile. One thing Jeremiah advised them to do was "plant gardens!" (By the way, if you look carefully at this banner, you'll see vines and greenery growing around the edges of the banner and the words. This is the artist's way of reminding us to plant gardens in difficult times and seasons in our lives.)

What a fascinating idea -- to plant a garden in a place or time you don't want to be in. I think it is Jeremiah's way of challenging the people to quit sitting around feeling sorry for themselves. After all, the purpose of faith is not to be as comfortable as possible, but to live deeply and well, making a positive impact in this world. In other words: while in exile, you better make the best of it.

Certainly, I find this true in our family. The coronavirus pandemic has not been easy. One thing I've noticed our 4 year-old twins doing more frequently is drawing a lot of drawings and doing a lot of artwork. With their mother and grandmother's help, they've even been making their own books and creating their own stories. There is a great hidden lesson in life here. Namely, that the best response for a hard day or difficult season in your life is to use your own hands to create something, adding something beautiful to the world. For you, this might be painting, doodling, journaling, woodworking, building, gardening, or any number of physical ways you can be creative and imaginative. For the truth is, a season of exile has surprisingly excellent potential for creativity. As Peterson argues, the result of the Babylonian exile for God's people "was that this became the most creative period in the entire sweep of Hebrew history. They did not lose their identity, they discovered it."

My prayer for you today, in this and every difficult season you find yourself in, is that you will choose to focus your energy on God by creating beautiful things and discovering the best version of yourself -- because that's exactly who God created you to be. Keep on keeping on,

Crossroads Updates

In the month of May, Community Crossroads volunteers, with the help of the Covid-19 response team, distributed 1,360 sack lunches, 722 groceries, and with Heath and Norbert distributed 232 breakfasts. Our wonderful Hospitality staff, Heath Brosi and Norbert Jankovich, with the assistance of Jacqueline Bender, Rachel Garlington, and Chris Bartley, served 294 dinners on Wednesday nights. Thank you to all the volunteers and staff who continue to meet the needs of our community and to everyone who supports the ministries at Crossroads.

There are lots of changes visible from outside when driving by Crossroads. The city has restriped Hemphill Street, and there are now five street parking spaces available on Hemphill St. right in front of the building. Brick is up on the outside of the new Community Crossroads addition. Inside walls and rooms are being built out and renovation continues. Exciting times!

Crossroads continues to distribute sack lunches to our neighbors on Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. In addition, Heath, Norbert, and Carol Toombs are serving coffee and breakfast every Monday morning from 9:30 - 10:30 a.m. Groceries are distributed every Wednesday and Thursday from 12 - 1:30 p.m. On Wednesday nights, Heath, Norbert, and volunteers distribute a hot meal to-go from 6 - 7 p.m.. Finally, Formula and Diapers are distributed the 3rd Monday of the month from 9 - 11 a.m.

Presbyterian Night Shelter Needs Breakfast and Lunch

To-Go Bags:

An Outreach Opportunity in Partnership with Mount Moriah Missionary Baptist

First Presbyterian Church has been asked to help provide breakfast and lunch to-go sack meals for guests at the Presbyterian Night Shelter campus. The need for meals has increased, and approximately 500 of both breakfast and lunch meals are needed each day. We are working with other churches, including Mount Moriah, to meet this need. Below is a list of items for each bag:

Breakfast Brown Bags:

- Granola bar or breakfast or protein bar
- Dry cereal or individual pastry
- Fresh fruit or fruit cups
- Choose a beverage: water, juice, milk

Lunch Brown Bags:

- Sandwich of any kind with condiments on the side (please place in a plastic baggie)
- Chips
- Crackers or granola bar
- Fruit cup or fresh fruit
- Cookies or brownies
- Choose a beverage: water, soda, sports drink

When you are preparing food and assembling bags, please use sanitary precautions: thoroughly wash your hands, use gloves, and wear a mask. Home-baked goods are fine, but please place them in individual baggies. Children (or adults!) are welcome to decorate the brown bags if they like. If your bag has food that requires immediate refrigeration (meat and cheese sandwiches, milk, for example), please label them so they can be stored properly.

Please prepare these sack meals from home and deliver to the church on Thursdays between 9:30 - 10 a.m. beginning July 2. Drive through the Great Hall covered driveway, where volunteers will retrieve them from your car (no need to get out). Meals will then be immediately delivered to the Presbyterian Night Shelter between 10 - 11 a.m. by a volunteer.

Please note, we do NOT want anyone to put themselves at additional risk or unnecessary exposure to acquire and donate any of these items. Please only purchase items when you are doing your own shopping and maintaining safe social distancing, or via online shopping and delivery.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY UPDATE



The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A) is currently meeting virtually due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Given the timing of the Assembly, a review of the business conducted and actions taken will not be available in time for the July Penn Street Letter publication deadline. A summary of the Assembly's actions and experience meeting virtually will be coming in the August Penn Street Letter. In the meantime, please keep in

your prayers the Co-Moderators of the 224th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A) Elona Street-Stewart and Gregory Bentley.

SESSION UPDATE ON THE PHASED APPROACH PLAN FOR REOPENING

The Session's Work Group on Reopening updated the Session at their June 14 meeting. Since the Phased Approach to Reopening was approved on May 17, the Work Group has continued to monitor the local health data provided by Tarrant County Health and consulted with committees and staff as preparations are made for reopening when the required local health metrics are met. The Work Group updated the Session on several items:

- the Live Stream Task Force has been formed and met June 15 as they prepare to recommend to Session what resources are required to launch live streaming of worship (Phase 3)
- the Worship and Music Committee has begun their work on recommendations to implement safety protocols and changes required for a return to modified In Person worship (Phase 2)
- the EEC Director, Mindy Samples, and Assistant Director, Alyssa Martin, are carefully planning for the required safety protocols and changes necessary for reopening the EEC (Phase 2) and implications for families, staff, and facilities
- the Administration Office has been acquiring necessary supplies (masks, sanitizers, plastic shields at reception desks, thermometers, etc.) for reopening the office (Phase 1)
- the local virus threat remains at Substantial as defined by Tarrant County Health and there has not yet been a 14 day decline in cases or the epidemic curve

The Session will continue to receive regular updates from the Work Group. The Session is saddened by the fact that the local public health conditions concerning the spread of COVID-19 are not yet improved to the point of safely reopening our facilities for FPC's ministries, and yearns to bring people back to our campuses safely for worship, the EEC, and our other ministries.



Want to take advantage of time at home to catch up on some reading? Welcome to Read the Bible in 9 Months!
