### FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH NAMES REV. DR. BRIAN COULTER AS PASTOR/HEAD OF STAFF



The Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) for First Presbyterian Church of Fort Worth joyfully announced the Rev. Dr. Brian Coulter was elected by the congregation on February 7 to serve as the next Pastor/Head of Staff.

Brian joins our congregation from First Presbyterian Church in Aiken, South Carolina, where he has served as Pastor/Head of Staff since 2014. He also serves as a Congregational Consultant for the Presbyterian Mission Agency, and previously served as Associate Pastor of Trinity Presbyterian Church in Fairhope, Alabama. He and his wife Megan have two daughters, Annabel and Paige.

Brian is a fifth generation pastor who states that he was "born, baptized, raised, confirmed and ordained within the PC(USA)." He received his undergraduate degree (B.A.) in sociology from Oklahoma State University, his masters (M.Div.) from Columbia Theological Seminary, and his doctorate (D.Min.) from McCormick Theological Seminary through the Association of Chicago Theological Schools program in homiletics.

The PNC said in a statement, "After a thorough and prayerful 14 month search, we are grateful to have been led to Brian and honored that he felt called to our mission of 'Inspiring Disciples and Engaging the World.' Our world class, divinely-inspired pastoral staff has guided our congregation through the challenges that our transitional time, a devastating pandemic, and the ongoing spiritual needs of a large and diverse congregation, have demanded. We are profoundly blessed by our pastors and our staff, and are thrilled that we have found a partner and a leader in Brian Coulter. We ask for your prayers for our congregation, Brian, and his family as they prepare for a move to our wonderful city."

## PASTOR'S LETTER

#### Dear friends,

Our theme for this Lent is *Cultivating and Letting Go*. As we journey through this month, preparing for the joy of Easter resurrection and new life, God is also at work cultivating us as a community of faith

for the mid-April arrival of the Rev. Dr. Brian Coulter as our new Pastor/Head of Staff. And all of this in the midst of the ongoing pandemic, racial and political divisions, and the after effects of the devastating storm we experienced last week.

I have increasingly found the prophets' writings -especially Isaiah- profoundly meaningful. Something about the exile experience resonates with my soul. As we now begin to see on the horizon signs of hope with vaccines being distributed and the increasing anticipation of post-pandemic possibilities, I have been drawn to the chapters in Isaiah when Israel anticipates an end to their exile. Isaiah 44 begins with this verse: *But now hear*, *O Jacob my servant*, *Israel whom I have chosen*!

Two powerfully important words begin a beautiful passage of reassurance of God's faithful love. *But now...* 

God spoke to Israel in the midst of exile, not after it was over – and that made all the difference. In the midst of exile, God is working to make a new creation. Now and for their future. It didn't happen overnight. And it didn't return things to the way they were. New life, new growth, new relationship with God that sustained Israel in their exile, their return, and their future as God's people.

God is speaking words of hope to us now and is working to make us new creations this Lent.

- The pandemic will not disappear in days or weeks or even months. Life will continue to be disrupted.
- Racial and political divisions will not disappear without the hard work of reconciliation and justice.
- Cleanup from the storm and the aftereffects of the anxiety it has caused so many will take time.

But now...

*But now* God speaks to us to assure us that we are God's people, and we can trust in God to be our rock. There is no other rock. No not one.

#### RACIAL EQUITY - FAITH AND RACIAL HEALING: APRIL 11 THROUGH JUNE 6

This 8-week zoom course adds an additional layer to our understanding of the impact of slavery and racism on our history, our culture, and our hopes for the future. It is neither a comprehensive story nor a glorious one. By exploring the psychological aspects of slavery on all people and understanding the role of our faith communities in perpetuating racism, we will gain insight into a side of history we don't often see in history books. Through truthful telling of the collective consequences of slavery and racism, as well as our willingness to hear these truths in order to begin healing, it is hoped we will be inspired and enabled to move toward a more just and free community and society. The course runs Sunday, April 11 (begins with Virtual Opening Retreat) through June 6, 2021, 3 - 5:30 p.m. The course combines reading materials, multimedia resources, and most importantly open, confidential dialog with the understanding that we are all learning from different starting points and can learn from each other's thoughts, feelings, and experiences. ### LOOKING FOR A MINISTRY OPPORTUNITY? COMMUNITY CROSSROADS HAS A PLACE FOR YOU!

Community Crossroads is First Presbyterian Church's mission outreach center in Fort Worth's near South neighborhood. Located at 1516 Hemphill (near the corner of Allen), the building houses various outreach ministries including Worship on Wednesdays, the church's food and clothing ministry, Formula and Diapers (FAD) ministry, the Salt & Light Dental Clinic, the Listening Post, and English as a Second Language.

With Covid-19 restrictions in place, Community Crossroads continues to:

- Distribute sack lunches on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays, from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.
- Distribute groceries on Wednesdays and Thursdays from 12 p.m. to 1:30 p.m.
- Serve a hot "to go" meal on Wednesday nights from 6 to 7 p.m.
- Serve "to go" breakfast on Mondays from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m.

Community Crossroads screens all volunteers, and all volunteers wear masks and physically distance in an effort to keep everyone safe.

- Bank lockbox: A bank lockbox is also available as a new option. This will be a direct bank mailing address. The bank will then process the checks and directly deposit them in the church's account. More details and the address will be published in a future newsletter.
