BRIAN COULTER TO BE INSTALLED JULY 11:

July 11 is the Installation Service for the Rev. Dr. Brian Coulter as Pastor/ Head of Staff. TAIZE WORSHIP RETURNS JULY 18:

July 18 is also the return of the monthly Taize worship service. This contemplative service in the Chapel at 6.30 p.m. includes reading of scripture, prayers, and the singing of music from the Taize community in France accompanied by a small ensemble.



PASTOR'S LETTER

Dear friends.

I heard someone refer to the long months of the pandemic as "Covidtide," as if it were an official season of the church year. Of course, those difficult months are guite different from the joyful times of Christmastide or Eastertide. We pivoted from life as we knew it and separated from people and places, like church

community, that provide such deep spiritual and emotional connections. We learned how to worship in online platforms and have meaningful discussions about the Bible or current events on Zoom. We all weathered the storms of Covidtide the best we could; and like Brian's recent sermon on Jesus calming the sea, we trusted that somehow God would show up with faithfulness and grace.

Although the "tide" in Covidtide doesn't refer to the sea, it reminds us that, like the ocean, the seasons of life wash over us and the storms of life can seem overwhelming. I shared with you all in a sermon a while back how in Cuba I had a narrow window of free time for 45 minutes in our schedule while we were at a Presbyterian congregation only two blocks from a beach. Some people chose to take a power nap; others went souvenir shopping; and I chose to go for a quick swim in the Atlantic. Someone asked me why I chose the hassle of a salty swim that requires changing clothes and drying off, and I surprised myself with my response. I said, "I need a moment to trust in buoyancy beyond my own abilities."

I love the sensation of floating on my back but the problem is: I don't like to have my ears underwater and I am always afraid that a big wave is going to wash an ocean full of water up my nose. And so I spent countless minutes trying to mitigate all the what-ifs. At first I kept straining my neck to see where the next wave might crest, or, wondering if I could really trust that the buoyancy would carry me. Finally, realizing the time crunch, I laid my head all the way back, ears fully submerged and trusted that the water would hold me. And buoyancy beyond my ability held me.

God's buoyancy beyond our ability held us in Covidtide, and as we now emerge from this time, we sense God's presence still carrying us, saying to us, "peace, be still." Maybe this summer you will find yourself near a body of water....if you do, imagine that through the waves and tides of life, both personally and collectively, God meets us with all grace and faithfulness and will complete the good work begun in us.

My daughter grew up in Como and my father still lives there. I am looking forward to moving back and being part of a community where everyone can come together and help each other during times of need. I am very thankful to Habitat for partnering with me to help make this possible."

YOUR GENEROSITY AT WORK: PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING PROJECT NEARS COMPLETION



In 2018, members of First Presbyterian Church joined with other concerned individuals and organizations in our community to form New Leaf Community Services. New Leaf works to provide permanent supportive housing, paired with case management and supportive services for persons who have been chronically homeless. Quail Trail, New Leaf's first permanent supportive housing project, is a completely self sufficient 48-unit permanent supported housing project in northwest Fort Worth for chronically homeless, disabled people. The \$4.7 million project will be debt free. Construction is funded by forgivable loans of federal funds from the City of Fort Worth, as well as grants from First Presbyterian Church of Fort Worth and five local foundations. The units are fully furnished and movein ready, complete with appliances and even fully stocked refrigerators, thanks to generous local donors. PW Circles have raised money for the "Feather the Nest" campaign and to provide WiFi access to all 48 units, providing residents with technology to enrich their lives and help them live independently. The project is nearing completion and expects to begin housing tenants within the next few weeks.
