Dear friends,

T.S. Eliot wrote a piece entitled Four Quartets. It is often published as a complete volume these days, but it was originally four separate poems that he released over the course of six years.

Written in and around World War II, they can stand alone as independent works but also contain connectivity with each other. They share similar themes that address our innate need for human relationships as well as how we relate with time, with the universe, and with the divine.

Some of the stuff he gets into can come across as scary or frightening, but I don't think it was intended to be. For instance, one portion about the Holy Spirit reads:

The dove descending breaks the air With flame of incandescent terror Of which the tongues declare The one discharge from sin and error. The only hope, or else despair Lies in the choice of pyre or pyre-To be redeemed from fire by fire.

I think Eliot used the imagery of flames — not for intimidation purposes — but in a purifying sense. I think he saw them as a new beginning, a fresh start, a tabula rasa. And while this can seem scary, we don't have to interpret it in that way. Another line he wrote reads:

For last year's words belong to last year's language And next year's words await another voice.

As we start 2022, we start a new year. It is no longer 2021 (nor is it 2020 —thanks be to God!!) And as we begin again, we realize that we are starting over once more. This can be intimidating and daunting at times, but that's only one way to interpret it. Perhaps this year can be the year after the refiner's fire. Perhaps this year can be the year in which we discover a new language. Perhaps this year can be the year of new birth adding another voice to our chorus.

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope ... 1 Peter 1.3




GRIEF GROUP

We will be following the study guide in Getting Grief Right: Finding Your Story of Love in the Sorrow of Loss, written by Dr. Patrick O'Malley and Tim Madigan.


