Fort Worth has been blessed with a plethora of gifted community leaders and volunteers who have given their time and treasure unselfishly. Among these were the Rev. Floyd and Dorothy Kinser, a truly powerful team. Servants of the church, the Kinsers were also servants of the community. Rev. and Mrs. Kinser elevated the word "service" by cultivating a passion for identifying, discovering, and meeting community needs wherever they served.

in Austin. They married in 1951, and had three sons, Glen, Kevin, and Owen. Dorothy was a school librarian, serving at several schools in Fort Worth ISD. Dorothy died in 2021, just six weeks after Floyd. in Southwest Fort Worth, adjacent to Texas Health Harris Southwest Hospital. The move was necessitated by regulatory requirements for the Center to have a standalone quarantine unit in the event that Covid-19 impacts the Center's residents. This meant the Day Program would need to be relocated to another campus.

A comprehensive fundraising campaign began in September 2021, which resulted in the West Center's ability to purchase a 6,000 square foot medical building in

southwest Fort Worth. Through God's grace, the building formerly housed a day program for adults with intellectual developmental disability, as well as those

with cognitive impairment (dementia). Construction and renovation of the space, along with the completion of the capital campaign, will conclude in late spring 2022. The program plans to open to the community in early May 2022.

A generous gift of \$1 million (over three years) from First Presbyterian Church secured the naming of the building,

A precursor to today's West Center, Floyd and the staff of First Presbyterian Church established a Senior Adult Day Care Program at the church to support the needs of families with loved ones diagnosed with dementia. Since that time, First Presbyterian Church

PASTOR'S LETTER

Dear friends,

With the month of March comes the season of spring and, also, this calendar year, the beginning of the liturgical season of Lent, the forty days in which we prepare for Holy Week and Easter. And this month also marks the two-year milestone of this COVID pandemic, when the "before times" abruptly came to halt. The last two Lents have been unusual and disorienting, to say the least.

You may find yourself wondering: after these incredibly challenging years, in a season of so much loss and deprivation, what can Lent possibly offer? Can't we zip on past Lent and go straight to Easter this year?! We have already given up so much (though I don't think our forced deprivations enhanced our spiritual attentiveness as many Lenten practices do!), and we are tired.

And yet, maybe, Lent is exactly what we need this year: a space to engage our faith with attention and intention...a space to cultivate life-giving practices...a time to heal and forgive, a time to repent and renew.... a space to clear out all the head clutter and anxiety and weariness.

Just recently, I claimed a chair in our house as "my space." I didn't have an extra side table available, so I used a cardboard box and covered it with a tablecloth. On it sits my Bible, a journal, a devotional book, and a simple piece of art. What a difference this little corner has been for me spiritually as a constant invitation to reflect and meditate, to read and pray. And it was so simple to do! Metaphorically, what would it be like for us to clear away some space, some time in this Lenten season, to listen, to pray, to wonder, to serve with intentionality?

In our church community, during Sunday morning worship, at Worship on Wednesdays, and in covenant groups, we will allow the verses of Psalm 23 to strengthen and encourage us. During our half-hour Midday Prayer services at noon, we will explore the words of the psalmists before a half hour organ concert. Spiritual practices like meditation or gratitude or prayer, readings from the Bible, or acts of outreach and service strengthen this season of spiritual renewal.

Receive the invitation of Lent this year as an opportunity to find renewal, to deepen your commitment to love God and neighbor as you are strengthened through God's grace and mercy.
