After a hiatus during the pandemic, Room in the Inn is returning to First Pres this summer! Room in the Inn (RITI) is a coalition of member congregations that provide hospitality for up to 14 men experiencing homelessness in Fort Worth one night a week during the coldest and hottest months of the year. We provide delicious food, a safe place to sleep and fellowship. The purpose of RITI is to build bridges of relationship, mutuality and respect between guests and hosts.

It takes a team to offer this hospitality so please consider using your gifts as a disciple to extend a warm welcome to guests this summer (Mondays, July 11- August 29). We are looking for 10 volunteer groups every week, people to drive the church bus on Monday afternoon (4:30-5:15 pm) to pick up our guests from True Worth Place, and on Tuesday mornings (6:45-7:30 am) to take our guests to True Worth Place. Other opportunities include greeting guests, setting up beds, and providing dinner. Above all, volunteers provide a warm welcome, friendly conversation, and service with dignity.

PASTOR'S LETTER



Dear friends,

On Mother's Day, my wife shared two pieces of note paper with me that contained a written conversation she had with our son during worship. It went something like this (for simplicity's sake, I'll italicize Annie's words, capitalize our son's words, and correct the spelling of some key words):

"Hi Shep! How are you? GOOD. Are you excited about going to today's TCU baseball game? YES YES YES MOM. Will you try to catch a foul ball? YES. [Insert various math problems.] CAN I GO TO THE WATER FOUNTAIN? When everyone stands up. WHY? So you don't bother Brian while he is preaching. BUT IT IS AN EMERGENCY! Wow! You are super thirsty! What will happen if you don't get water? I WILL SCREAM! Whoa! That would really bother the sermon then! Why does being thirsty make you scream? BECAUSE IT IS A NEED. Good point. I think the sermon is almost done. Also, I like the T-Rex charm you gave me for Mother's Day - why did you pick it? I GIVE UP, I'M GOING."

We all know the truth. It's difficult to keep young people in church. Holding their attention is getting harder and harder. They love their water fountain breaks, screen time, and soccer games. Sunday is no longer a holy day in our culture. To make matters more complicated – the older our children get, the more complicated their schedules become. Sticking with church is not easy.

Recently, we celebrated high school graduates at our annual Senior Dinner (don't miss their bios in this newsletter as well as the display case outside the sanctuary). Seniors are the busiest people on the planet, so I am always amazed and grateful for the seniors and their families who make time for this milestone event. Volunteers prepare lovely decorations, underclassmen serve seniors a fancy dinner, folks volunteer to make fun senior survival kits (i.e. ramen noodles, candy, duct tape, etc.), and there's a fun slideshow that helps us reminisce together on these young people who have grown up right in front of our eyes.

It is always meaningful to celebrate the students who have stuck with church through the years and made youth group a conscious priority in their lives. Personally, my favorite part of the Senior Dinner program is when I interview each of our graduates on the Youth Center stage. With a microphone in hand, seniors answer questions I've given them ahead of time, but I offer some surprise questions too. What stuck out to me this year were the comments our seniors made when asked,



"What advice would you give to a rising 6th grader or someone new to youth group?" Here were some of their answers, and I find these to be universally profound for our life together as a family of faith:

"Well, I feel like every year everyone says, 'Just go to the events.' But it's true. Especially when you're in middle school, I feel like you should try to go to as much as you can. Sign up for things. Even if you need financial help, this church can always help. Do as much as you can."

"Come to all the stuff you can. Be outgoing. Make as many friends as you can because they'll be with you throughout your time here. It's cool to make new friendships."

"Go on mission trips. Find a way to get involved in the church. Whether it's on a committee or in choir or something else, find a way. I guarantee it will be worth it."

"Put yourself out there. I was really shy, so I understand this well. It can be hard to talk to new people and really participate. You may be apprehensive toward it. But once you get over that initially, it becomes so much fun! It makes such a difference to be actively involved rather than stay home. It's so worth it no matter what fears you might have. The outcome is always way better than you imagine."

"Don't be afraid. Whether it's not being afraid to be your true self or that you're not going to make friends. Remember our youth group motto, "Everyone is welcome." You don't have to be afraid here because everyone is so welcoming and you're always going to find your place."

What wonderful reminders! I don't know about you, but these young disciples inspire me to put myself out there, take more risks, and get busy living this life of faith! Thanks to Jesus Christ, there is a place for me here. There is a place for you too. The hardest step to take is always the first step, and what a gift it is that we are never alone as we travel this faith journey together.

Session Makes Gift to Presbyterian Publishing Corporation

At its April Stated Meeting the Session voted unanimously on a motion from the Adult Christian Nurture Committee, with the concurrence of the Trustees, to make a \$100,000 gift in memory of Jeanie Davis, Marjorie Lewis, and Ginny Richards to the Presbyterian Publishing Corporation's A New Story: A Campaign for the Third Century of Presbyterian Publishing.

For nearly 200 years, the Presbyterian Publishing Corporation and its predecessors have told stories. These stories shaped the landscape of biblical studies, theology, preaching and ethics; taught the ways of discipleship; and showed us better ways to be human together. This campaign enables the Presbyterian Publishing Corporation to prepare the organization for the stories and the storytellers that the future will require.

An element of the campaign is Supporting Scholarship. Specifically, continuing the influence of Westminster John Knox Press as the premier religious publisher of religious academic scholarship by increasing the number of academic titles published each year; hiring additional editorial staff to acquire and publish additional academic work; and holding biennial workshops to mentor the writing skills of young scholars.

First Presbyterian's gift in memory of Jeanie Davis, Marjorie Lewis, and Ginny Richards honors the legacy of these long-time leaders and encouragers of substantive adult Christian education at First Presbyterian Church and joins their faithful and inspiring stories to the third century of ministry by the Presbyterian Publishing Corporation and the faith that will be nurtured in churches, academic institutions, and homes for decades to come.
