Inspiring Disciples... Engaging the World...

The mission and ministry of First Presbyterian is extensive as we Inspire Disciples and Engage the World. Many of the ministries of the church accompany us in the most tender of life experiences. That is especially true of ministries when death occurs.

Over the course of a year, First Presbyterian Church Pastors conduct 30-40 Memorial Services, Funeral Services, and Graveside services for church members and their families. Services occur in the Chapel, Great Hall, Sanctuary, Memorial Garden, and at Funeral Homes and Cemeteries. For services conducted at First Presbyterian Church, the church offers families a reception following the service, which is coordinated by our Parish Visitor, Jennifer Regen. Our Director of Music/Organist, Ahreum Han Congdon, provides or arranges music for the services. Support Staff communicates to the congregation about upcoming services and prepares the bulletins, while Maintenance staff tends to the building, grounds, and sound needs.

Several committees and their ministries support families through ongoing pastoral care and concern. The Congregational Care Committee provides tender pastoral care at the time of death and in the months following through Care Teams, Stephen Ministry, Grief Support Group, Prayer Line, Prayer Shawl, and Muffin Ministry. The Worship and Music Committee provides for an All Saints service each November 1. The Chancel Choir and guest musicians, along with clergy, surround families at the All Saints service as they remember once again their loved ones who have died in the past year and encourage one another with hope. The Property Committee maintains the Memorial Garden so that it remains a place of beauty and comfort for the community.

For the thousands of people who gather for services, many who are experiencing the ministry of First Presbyterian for the first time, the members and staff of First Presbyterian Church are inspiring disciples who witness to and extend the love, grace, comfort, and peace of Jesus Christ during the tender time of grief and loss.

STEPHEN MINISTRY IS HERE FOR YOU

We all experience difficult times in our lives. Whether it is a loss of employment, a period of illness or the loss of a loved one; these times of crisis can strain us emotionally and spiritually. Fortunately, we do not have to face these times alone. There are members of FPC who are willing to walk alongside you.

Since the 1980s FPC has participated in the Stephen Ministry program. Stephen Ministry was created by Rev. Dr. Kenneth Haugk, a Lutheran minister and clinical psychologist. This program trains lay members to understand Jesus Christ as the ultimate caregiver and equips them to help individuals through a specific crisis over several months. The Stephen Ministers are also provided training in active listening, healthy boundaries, and how to use prayer and scripture pastorally. These kind members of our congregation are here and available to be a source of support.

Recognizing that there are also pastoral needs within our congregation that extend beyond a single moment of crisis, FPC developed a Sustaining Care ministry as a companion to Stephen Ministry. These caregivers work with people who may not expect a resolution to their issue, but still benefit from some support. Sustaining Care provides companionship and a friendly ear for people to share their life stories with. Sustaining Caregivers help their care receivers discover the hope within their own narratives.

Stephen Minsters and Sustaining Caregivers work with the Pastoral Care staff to meet the needs of the congregation. If you would like to know more about these programs, or if you believe that you could benefit from them, please reach out to a Pastor or Parish Visitor.
